Conference Reports

The 9th International Conference on Business, Relations, and Diplomacy (ICOBIRD 2020)

The world is grappling with the impact of COVID-19, which first emerged in Wuhan, a city in Hubei province in China in November 2019. It spread to the rest of the world quickly. It was declared as global pandemic by the World Health Organization (WHO). COVID-19 has changed the world's social, political and economic relations. In order to contain this dreaded virus, most countries were put under lock-downs restricting the movements of the people both within the countries and across national borders. The national economies have been hit hard by COVID-19.

The State has re-emerged as more stronger than ever before as the protector of its territory and people. The State has to go to extraordinary extent to manage the socio-economic and political impacts of Covid-19. Among many other steps, the states closed their borders to stop people from travelling and spreading the disease. One of the immediate impacts on COVID-19 on international relations is the way diplomacy is conducted. Face-to-face diplomatic communications have been replaced with more reliance on such on-line platforms as Google Meet, Zoom etc. States are now prefer to conduct their normal day-to-day communications through digital means and artificial intelligence. Therefore, a thorough discussion on the role of the State during the period of the pandemic is most relevant.

Keeping all these recent developments in view, the Department of International Relations, Faculty of Humanities, Bina Nusantara University successfully organized a two-day International Conference on Business, International Relations, and Diplomacy (known as ICOBIRD) with the theme "Business, International relations, and Diplomacy during COVID-19 Pandemic: Challenges, Responses, and Consequences" from September 24 to September 25, 2020. It may be pointed out that the Department has been successfully organizing ICOBIRD for the last nine years. However, ICOBIRD 2020 was successfully held on-line. ICOBIRD 2020 which was hosted by the Department of International University in collaboration with the Indonesian Association for International Relations (AIHII) took the form of webinar, which is part of BINUS International Joint Conference (BIJC). ICOBIRD has always been a platform for scholars, students, and researchers to share their research outputs. This year's conference was based on an interdisciplinary approach in understanding COVID-19 pandemic and evaluate its impacts on business, international relations, and diplomacy.

As it was reported that the ICOBIRD 2020 committee received 53 submissions. However, following blind reviews 35 of these were accepted for presentations. These papers were presented in eight parallel sessions after the opening and key note sessions in the morning of the first day of ICOBIRD 2020 on September 24, 2020. On the opening day of ECOBIRD 2020, the Chair of ICOBIRD 2020, Dr. Lili Yulyadi Arnakim welcomed the presenters and participants, which was followed by welcoming remarks by Head of International Relations Department, Dr. Rangga Aditya. Finally, ICOBIRD 2020 was officially launched by Professor. Dr. Tirta N. Mursitama, Vice Rector, Research and Technology Transfer, and General Chair of BJIC. In his speech he announced that ICOBIRD 2020 is the third conference to be held following ICOBAR, and ICIMTech. After opening ceremony, three distinguish keynote speakers from different countries namely, Malaysia, South Korea, and Australia presented their keynote speeches.

First keynote speaker Dr. Ishtiaq Hussain, who is Associate Professor of Political Science at International Islamic University, Malaysia (IIUM), Kuala Lumpur and editor of *Intellectual Discourse*, discussed the response of developing countries toward COVID-19. Dr. Ishtiaq Hossain argues that the responses can be classified into three categories, namely, good, muddled, and the ugly, by referring respectively to Senegal, Bangladesh, and Brazil. This session which was moderated by Dr. Moch. Faisal Karim received enthusiastic response from the audience. Second keynote speaker Dr. Kim Hyung Jong from Department of International Relations, Yonsei University, South Korea. His topic for discussion was "ASEAN Community and Human Security". He argued that the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) poses great challenges not only for health security in the region but also for the establishment of the ASEAN Community. The ASEAN member states (AMS) are facing double challenges: they have to curb the pandemic while mitigating its economic and social impacts. AMS has to deal with COVID-19 by taking assertive measures to protect public health in the region. The session which was moderated by Dr. Lili Yulyadi Arnakim, received many questions from members of the audience. Finally, the third keynote speaker Prof. Dr. Mark Beeson from Department of Political Science and International Relations, University of Western Australia discussed the politics of Covid-19. Prof. Mark Beeson's session which was moderated by Dr. Ella S. Prihatini, argued that the response of the United States has been strikingly bad, and this has undermined confidence in its ability to play an effective leadership role in an international order it did so much to create. The prospects for cooperation between China and the US on health policy and other vital issues such as climate change have been further eroded as a result. This presentation considered the political consequences of the pandemic on the current international order and our collective ability to deal with major transnational problems. This keynote session was open to public via Zoom and live through YouTube streaming that could allow participants to join the session. As a result, the audience for the keynote session reached up to 600 participants from all over the world.

The afternoon session consisted of eight parallel sessions focusing on different issues. One of the key issues, which was discussed was the response of the state, market and politics to COVID-19. Another parallel session focused on the role of China in international politics. Issues related to socio-economic implication, and development and inequality in the Southeast Asian region were discussed in two parallel sessions. On the second day, a "Meet the Editor", in which the editor of the *Intellectual Discourse* took part. He led a lively discussion on ways to publish the conference paper in targeted reputable international journals such as *Intellectual Discourse*.
