


Figure 1: Research Method




Figure 8: Cultural Trails and Experiences

Immersive Activities and Interactions


- Along the cultural trails, interactive installations, sensorial experiences, and hands-on activities are integrated to actively engage visitors with the local culture.




Figure 9: Community Collaboration
